



1 Purpose

This report has been prepared by the Chief Executive of the Department for Housing and Urban Development (the Designated Entity) for consideration by the Minister for Planning (the Minister) in adopting the Tintinara Airfield Code Amendment (the Code Amendment).

The report details the engagement that has been undertaken, the outcomes of the engagement including a summary of the feedback made, the response to the feedback and the proposed changes to the Code Amendment. In addition, the report evaluates the effectiveness of the engagement and whether the principles of the Community Engagement Charter have been achieved. Any changes to the engagement plan during the process are also outlined.

2 Introduction

The Code Amendment will spatially apply the Residential Aviation Estate Subzone (the RAE Subzone) to part of the existing Infrastructure (Airfield) Zone at Tintinara, to provide opportunities for the development of a small number of dwellings with private aircraft hangars within the established airfield.

The Code Amendment seeks to reinstate policies that were previously introduced into the Coorong District Council Development Plan in 2017. The previous development plan policies related specifically to developing a residential airpark in a portion of the then Airfield Zone.

The policies were not transitioned into the Planning and Design Code (the Code), when the Code was first implemented for this area in July 2020 because, at that time, there was no suitable subzone or replacement policy in the 'Code library'.

In March 2021, Phrase Three of the Code was implemented and the 'Code library' was expanded to include the RAE Subzone within the existing Infrastructure (Airfield) Zone.

The RAE Subzone policies provide opportunities for low density residential development where it is integrated with the operation of the airfield, consistent with the scale of existing buildings and complementary to the open character of the airfield and surrounding rural landscape. These policies only allow for residential development where the dwelling is located on the same allotment as a private aircraft hangar that is associated with the dwelling.

The draft Code Amendment is proposing to apply the RAE Subzone to the same area as the previous Residential Airpark, as per the previous Development Plan Concept Plan Map (Concept Plan Map CooD/1).

The draft Code Amendment policies will:

- limit building height and scale and mitigate adverse amenity impacts on neighbouring dwellings
- require outbuildings, including the associated aircraft hangar, to be subordinate to the associated dwelling and have a maximum height of 9 metres to complement the height and scale of nearby buildings
- limit site coverage to 35 per cent of the allotment area and includes setback policies which require separation and space between buildings to reduce the cumulative impacts of buildings in the locality.

To accommodate a dwelling and associated outbuildings in a spacious setting, new allotments within the proposed RAE Subzone would need to be at least 2,000 square metres and have a minimum frontage of at least 30 metres. The proposed RAE Subzone would be approximately 12,000 square metres with a street frontage of approximately 200 metres, thereby allowing for the creation of approximately six new residential allotments.

The existing Infrastructure (Airfield) Zone is located more than 200 metres from the nearest dwelling and approximately 650 metres north-east of the Tintinara township in the Coorong District Council. The area affected by the Code Amendment is located in the south-east corner of the existing Infrastructure (Airfield) Zone and entirely within the zone boundaries.

3 Engagement approach

The process for amending a designated instrument (including the process to amend the Planning and Design Code) is set out in the *Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016* (the Act). The Act requires consultation in relation to the Code Amendment to comply with the Community Engagement Charter.

The Designated Entity prepared an engagement plan (the Engagement Plan) to apply the principles of the Community Engagement Charter. The purpose of this engagement was to:

- raise awareness of the proposed Code Amendment including the location of where the proposed changes will apply
- provide information about what is proposed by the Code Amendment and the rationale behind the Code Amendment
- provide information about what the proposed subzone changes will mean for the locality, including potential land uses and development/s
- establish communication pathways and provide opportunities for stakeholders and the community to seek clarification and/or provide feedback on the proposal
- seek feedback from affected and interested persons on the Code Amendment
- comply with the statutory requirements as they relate to engagement on a Code Amendment and engage in accordance with the Community Engagement Charter
- provide the opportunity to respond to stakeholders and the affected community, to inform them of
 any decisions made in respect of the proposal, including any changes made as a result of the
 consultation process.

The engagement activities outlined below occurred as set out in the Engagement Plan. It was not necessary to alter the scope or level of consultation outlined in the Engagement Plan.

3.1 Engagement activities

Community engagement website (PlanSA portal)

The proposed Code Amendment documentation and supporting information was available publicly online for the duration of the community engagement period. The PlanSA portal was the primary platform for information and submitting feedback.

A web banner promoting the community engagement was also published on the landing page of the PlanSA website, providing greater visibility and the following information:

- an overview of the Code Amendment
- the Code Amendment document
- a fact sheet outlining the proposed changes
- a submission form to provide feedback
- · contact details for all enquiries.

YourSAy webpage

A webpage dedicated to this consultation was set up on the SA Government YourSAy website which exists to promote government consultations.

All consultation material was made available on the webpage, including a link to provide feedback.

352 people visited the Tintinara Airfield Code Amendment YourSAy page during the consultation period.





Availability of community engagement materials

The Code Amendment, engagement plan and community information sheet were available to view at the civic offices of the Coorong District Council.

The draft Code Amendment document, fact sheet and engagement plan were made available electronically on the PlanSA website and on the YourSAy webpage: https://plan.sa.gov.au/en/code_amendments.

Community Information Session

There was no community information session held for this Code Amendment because it was considered to be locally specific, and given its location and nature, would only impact a small number of allotments. Therefore, it was considered more effective to speak to interested members of the community directly, if required, rather than hold a Community Information Session.

3.2 Mandatory requirements

The following mandatory engagement requirements have been met:

- the Coorong District Council were directly notified and consulted on the Code Amendment.
- the landowners directly impacted by the proposed changes and those adjacent to the area affected were directly notified and invited to participate in the consultation.

4 Evaluation of Engagement

To ensure the principles of the Community Engagement Charter (the Charter) are met, an evaluation of the engagement process for the Code Amendment has occurred.

5.1 Performance Indicators for Evaluation

The minimum mandatory performance indicators have been used to evaluate engagement on the Code Amendment. These measures help to gauge how successful the engagement has been in meeting the Charter's principles for good engagement.

Evaluation of Engagement by Community Members

The minimum mandatory performance indicators required an evaluation of responses from members of the community on the engagement. This includes an evaluation of whether (or to what extent) community members felt:

- 1. that the engagement genuinely sought their input to help shape the proposed Code Amendment
- 2. **confident their views were heard** during the engagement
- 3. they were given an adequate opportunity to be heard
- 4. they were given sufficient information so that they could take an informed view
- 5. **informed** about why they were being asked for their view, and the way it would be considered.

The evaluation of engagement by community members for this consultation was undertaken via a survey sent to all 17 people who provided feedback on the proposal. The survey questions were based on the above mandatory performance indicators.

No survey responses were received, which we presume indicates that most people were satisfied with the engagement process.

Evaluation of Engagement by the Designated Entity

A further evaluation of the engagement process is required to be undertaken by (or on behalf of) the Designated Entity. The minimum performance indicators require an evaluation by the Designated Entity of whether (or to what extent) the engagement:

- 1. occurred early enough for feedback to genuinely influence the planning policy, strategy or scheme
- 2. **contributed to the substance** of the final draft Code Amendment
- 3. reached those identified as communities or stakeholders of interest
- 4. provided feedback to community about outcomes of engagement
- 5. was **reviewed throughout** the process and **improvements put in place**, or recommended for future engagement.

The evaluation of the engagement was undertaken by the PLUS Communications and Engagement team on behalf of the Designated Entity. The results of the evaluation are contained in Attachment 1 to this Engagement Report.

5.2 Evaluation against the Charter principles

The following is a summary of the evaluation of the engagement against the five principles of the Charter. The full results of the evaluation can be found in Attachment 1 to this Engagement Report.

(1) Engagement is genuine

People had faith and confidence in the engagement process

All communications clearly laid out what was being consulted on, how the consultation process would be conducted, and where to find more information.

The PlanSA email and phone line provided a direct link to the project team for any queries.

(2) Engagement is inclusive and respectful

Affected and interested people had the opportunity to participate and be heard

People directly impacted by this proposal were contacted, and the engagement activities sought to promote the consultation more widely to interested people and groups across the state.

(3) Engagement is fit for purpose

People were effectively engaged and satisfied with the process

People were clear about the proposed change and how it would affect them

There were no responses to the engagement survey by consultation participants which we presume means that most people were satisfied with the engagement process.

The feedback received during consultation indicates that people understood and were clear on what was being proposed.

(4) Engagement is informed and transparent

All relevant information was made available, and people could access it

People understood how their views were considered, the reasons for the outcomes and the final decision that was made

All consultation materials were made easily available on the PlanSA and YourSAy websites, as well as onsite at the Coorong District Council offices.

All consultation participants were thanked for their feedback and provided with a 'What We Heard' summary of feedback. This engagement report provides further detail on the feedback received and final decision.

(5) Engagement processes are reviewed and improved

The engagement was reviewed, and improvements recommended

The consultation process for this Code Amendment has been reviewed and assessed as having met the Community Engagement Charter principles for good engagement.

There were no specific improvements recommended as a result of this review.

5 Engagement Outcomes

5.1 Feedback received

17 submissions were received, including 11 from members of the public, a submission from Coorong District Council and 5 from government agencies and industry stakeholders.

Of the 17 submissions received, 12 (71%) supported the Code Amendment outcomes while the remaining 5 (29%) were either impartial, discussed matters that do not affect the outcome of the Code Amendment, or did not object to the Code Amendment outcomes.

The key feedback received can be summarised as follows:

- support for the Code Amendment
- protect trees along the eastern boundary
- the need for development to comply with the relevant bushfire hazard policies
- the preference for wastewater to be connected to the Community Wastewater Management System
- the need for development not to have a deleterious effects on the quality or quantity of source water, or the natural environments that rely on this water
- the need for development to avoid or minimise erosion.and not dam, interfere, or obstruct a watercourse
- the need for site contamination to be assessed given the land is changing to allow for more sensitive land uses.

Among the feedback, there was majority support for the proposal from community members and airfield users. It was observed there should be for support for more residential aviation around the country, noting there is a shortage of hangarage around Australia. Support was expressed for having the residents who are users of the airport close to the air traffic environment.

State agency representatives noted requirements relating to bushfire hazards, site contamination, water supply and wastewater, but were principally supportive of the code amendment.

Responses to the key issues raised are outlined below.

5.2 Response and recommendations

Agency feedback

Agency feedback about requirements for bushfire hazards, site contamination, wastewater and access to water is noted.

The Code currently contains relevant and appropriate policies to guide the assessment of these matters.

Bushfire hazard, site contamination, wastewater and access to water will be assessed in future development applications for the site, including land division and subsequent dwelling/hangar applications.

Specific queries were raised around the ability of future allotments to achieve bushfire asset protection zones from both unmanaged grassland and the row of trees to the south-east of the affected area.

It's acknowledged that separation from the row of trees adjacent the eastern boundary and unmanaged grasslands may be required for bushfire safety. This Code Amendment does not propose a particular allotment layout or dimensions, and therefore separation distances could be assessed in any future land division application, ensuring the allotments are of suitable size and dimension for their intended use (to accommodate a dwelling and aircraft hangar). Assessment of bushfire asset protection zones would be undertaken as part of any future dwelling application.

Recommendation: No change.

Tree Protection

Concerns were raised that the 15-metre-wide buffer in the south-western corner of the affected area would not be large enough to enable protection of the existing trees and should therefore be increased to 20 metres.

The Native Vegetation Overlay applies to the area affected. If the existing trees constitute native vegetation (as defined by the *Native Vegetation Act 1991*) their removal will require consent of the Native Vegetation Council. If the trees do not constitute native vegetation, existing Code policy that speaks to the incorporation of existing significant vegetation may be drawn upon by the relevant planning authority to seek that their retention be incorporated into development, including land division.

For the purposes of this Code Amendment, the proposed subzone is considered large enough to provide for development outcomes that protect the trees, which are identified on the affected area map.

Recommendation: No change.

6 Summary of recommended changes

After reviewing the submissions from the community engagement process, which were primarily supportive of the Code Amendment and did not object to the changes being proposed, no post-consultation amendments were made to the draft Code Amendment.

7 Code Amendment instructions

The following amendment instructions (at the time of drafting) relate to the Planning and Design Code, version 2024.12 published on 4 July 2024. Where amendments to the Planning and Design Code have been published after this date, consequences changes to the following amendment instructions will be made as necessary to give effect to this Code Amendment.

Amendment Instructions


Amend the Code as follows:
